Poverty in North Carolina

- The State of North Carolina ranks 38th nation wide for people living in poverty
- Overall 15.4% of North Carolinians live in poverty
- 21.3% are children



Poverty in North Carolina

Buncombe - 38,925 in poverty – 15.2%

Henderson – 15075 in poverty – 13.2%

Madison - 4,460 in poverty – 20.9%

Polk 2,745 in poverty – 13.5%

Rutherford- 12,752 in poverty – 19.2%

Transylvania 5,156 in poverty – 15.4%

How does poverty impact justice?

The poor can't afford an attorney and often lack the skills & knowledge to advocate for themselves:

- Food
- Medical care,
- Health
- Financial options
- Income supports

- Employment
- Education
- Safety from abuse
- Children's issues

NC Rule 6.1 Rules of professional conduct







NC Rule 6.1

NC RPC 6.1: Every lawyer has a professional responsibility to provide legal services to those unable to pay. A lawyer should aspire to render at least (50) hours of pro bono public legal services per year.



Rule 6.1: Pro Bono Legal Services

In fulfilling this responsibility, the lawyer should:

- (a) provide a substantial majority of the (50) hours of legal services without fee or expectation of fee to:
 - (1) persons of limited means;
 - (2) charitable, religious, civic, community, governmental and educational organizations in matters that are designed primarily to address the needs of persons of limited means; or



Rule 6.1: Law Related Activities

- (b) provide any additional services through:
 - (1) the delivery of legal services described in paragraph (a) at a substantially reduced fee; or
 - (2) participation in activities for improving the law, the legal system or the legal profession.



Rule 6.1: Financial Support

In addition, a lawyer should voluntarily contribute financial support to organizations that provide legal services to persons of limited means.



Why are we asked to take on this responsibility?

[8] The legal profession is a group of people united in a learned calling for the public good. At their best, lawyers assure the availability of legal services to all, regardless of ability to pay, and as leaders of their communities, states, and nation, lawyers use their education and experience to improve society. It is the basic responsibility of each lawyer to provide community service, community leadership, and public interest legal services without fee, or at a substantially reduced fee, in such areas as poverty law, civil rights, public rights law, charitable organization representation, and the administration of justice.

MAVL -benefits

MAVL - DV

- Domestic violence cases
 - Dozens of requests for help each week
 - DV Court Thursday morning
 - Brief service Big impact.
- Child Abuse issues
- Custody matters arising from DV



Your help is greater than you know!

- Our clients average 2-3 civil legal issues
 - Not uncommon for the presenting legal issue to NOT be the most urgent
 - Example -
 - Client seeks help for food stamp denial
 - May be entitled to Medicaid, Social Security benefits, housing, other rights he or she not aware of.



Be aware of our client's issues:

- Most of our client's are extremely pleased to obtain assistance, and very grateful for your help
- However, some clients' past encounters with legal system have been negative
- Barriers:
 - Transportation
 - Limited access to phone
 - Language
- Some clients have untreated mental health issues



Justice in Jeopardy

Most legal needs studies show that 80% of low-income people have no access to a lawyer when they need one in civil matters.



The barriers faced by unrepresented litigants

- lack of familiarity with court procedures and forms
- lack of knowledge of their rights and obligations under the law
- how to file a document
- where to stand in court
- how to prepare and present evidence
- how to correspond with opposing parties, counsel and the court
- what documents they will need, how to respond to questions about their case



Because of these issues, without an attorney:

- Many defendants simply don't show up hearings or trial
- Many believe they won't get a fair shake, so why bother.
- they believe any effort to advocate for themselves is futile
- those who do show don't know what their rights are
- very small percentage have counsel, or have spoken to an attorney.
- Therefore, your advice takes minutes, but can change a client's world.



Pro Bono Attorneys make a Difference

Studies show those without lawyers lose!

 A domestic violence study showed 83 percent of woman represented by an attorney obtained a protection order, compared to only about 33 percent who were pro se.



Unmet Legal Needs

- More than 80,000 people in poverty in western North Carolina are eligible for legal aid.
- Average income of Pisgah Legal Services' clients is \$11,700.
- 10,817 request for service at Pisgah Legal Services
- We can't meet that need without your help

How MAVL works

- Pisgah Legal Services does an initial intake with the clients we refer through the MAVL program to help ensure that they meet income eligibility guidelines and have a priority legal need.
- MAVL attorneys select the types of cases they will accept, and review proposed case referrals prior to accepting a client for representation.



Retired attorneys are needed

- What is Pro Bono Status?
 - Pro bono practice status allows inactive/retired and out-of-state lawyers to provide pro bono legal assistance to indigent clients through a nonprofit legal services corporation in a variety of practice areas and levels of time commitment.



Who can provide pro bono services in retirement

- Who is Eligible?
 - Pro Bono Emeritus = inactive North Carolina attorneys in good standing
 - Pro Bono Status for Out-of-State Lawyers = attorney living in North Carolina who is licensed in another state (whether active or inactive) in good standing



Benefits of Serving in Retirement with Pro Bono Status

- No membership dues are owed to the NC State Bar;
- No mandatory continuing legal education must be completed each year (though CLE may be taken if desired); and
- Pisgah Legal Services' malpractice insurance covers pro bono volunteers.



Supervision over Pro Bono Status

- The rules require all lawyers granted probono practice status to work under the supervision of a licensed NC attorney at a legal aid organization (who will provide a statement of supervision to the NC State Bar Council).



Pro Bono Reporting

- Lawyers are encouraged to report pro bono legal services to Pisgah Legal Services in order that such service might be recognized and serve as an inspiration to others.
- It significantly helps the reputation of lawyers when the public is aware of the work you do for those who can't afford to pay for justice.



Pro Bono Reporting

- 22 other states track pro bono hours of attorneys.
 - 9 Mandatory
 - Florida, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Nevada, New Mexico, New York
 - 13 Voluntary
 - Arizona, Connecticut, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Montana, Ohio, Oregon, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Washington + North Carolina

Pro Bono Recognition

- Each Attorney who reports at least 50 hours of pro bono legal service in 2018 will:
 - be inducted into the 2018 North Carolina Pro Bono Honor Society
 - receive a certificate from the Supreme Court of North
 Carolina honoring their achievement



Barriers to Pro Bono

- Time constraints as the top factor discouraging them from providing more probono service.
- Lack of skills or experience in the practice areas needed.
- Lack of desire or interest in doing pro bono was <u>not</u> a highly discouraging factor.



Overcoming the barriers

- Short time to prepare
 - Domestic Violence cases tried always on Thursday (Buncombe)
 - Housing cases less than a week to prepare
 - Pisgah Legal can help
